



"Major surgery required! We need a Convention on the Rights of Older People"

20 Years - Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing (MIPAA) 20 Years - UNECE Regional Implementation Strategy (RIS): Experiences, Achievements and the Way Forward



"What is needed is major surgery that would drastically remove the cancers of existing inequalities, remove existing violations of human rights, remove existing deficits in legislation, policies and programs, remove existing ageism and elder abuse, and remove existing acceptance of the disposability of older persons. They should all be removed, immediately." This heartfelt and powerful statement came from Frances Zainoeddin, Vice Chair of the NGO Committee on

Ageing New York, who was addressing a webinar convened by the International Federation on Aging (IFA), the NGO Committee on Ageing in Vienna, and the Austrian Federal Ministry of Social Affairs on 20 years' of MIPAA.

Frances asked: "Are we moving forward?" And replied emphatically, "I would say yes, but at a snail's pace. If we continue like this, by the time the youth of today reach 65, they will have to continue our current fight for a dignified life. We do not want cosmetic treatment; we need major surgery. And major surgery means having a convention." <u>Read more</u>.

The Global Alliance for the Rights of Older Persons (GAROP), founded in 2011 by a collaborative of <u>nine organizations</u>, is today a network of more than 380 organizations working to achieve its mission to support and enhance civil society's engagement with Member States and National Human Rights Institutions at national, regional and international levels around a Convention on the Rights of Older Persons.

Age Advocacy has surfaced as the first of three priority action areas for the Pass It On Network in current discussions about our plan for the next three years. GAROP's leadership for collaborative advocacy will be critical for making major progress.

"For drought-stricken Zimbabwe, the COVID-19 epidemic is just the last straw!"



Beatrice Sithole, who founded The Touch of Power in Zimbabwe in 2015, spoke up for senior citizens at the World Forum on Energy Regulation in Cancun Mexico in 2018. She has attended forums in South Africa, Sweden and Indonesia.

Beatrice Sithole's driving purpose right now is to help older people stretch their dollars. "So many of us are grannies parenting our orphaned grandchildren and struggling to put food on the table. The situation in Zimbabwe is dramatic. Our country is landlocked. We have been hit by three successive droughts and the economy is in serious difficulty. COVID is just the last straw!

This is the reality faced by Beatrice, our new country liaison for Zimbabwe. Five years ago, as a selfemployed entrepreneur, she felt the need to do something positive with and for older people. She formed a Board of Trustees and they founded the Power of Touch Institution to reach out and help older people.

When asked about the name of her organization, she says that everyone has the power of choice and can exercise that choice to touch the lives of those around them, however small or large their circle of influence.

Seeking long term solutions

The Power of Touch (PoT) helps senior citizens stretch their dollars by partnering with service providers willing to offer discounted or free service. Unfortunately, COVID has shrunk the number of providers and funders. "It's nonstop struggle," she says, "but we've managed to deliver food - mostly maize and beans – and medicines to people. We know this is very short term. We absolutely must find ways of making us independent, by developing small vegetable growing enterprises and maybe raising chickens. "We count on the support of more than 3000 members of the Zimbabwean diaspora scattered around the world."

PoT has an outreach program in the rural areas. "Times are hard," she says, "and people really appreciate getting together for some light relief and stimulation. We organize monthly meet-ups where we invite various speakers to talk about issues such as dementia, exercising, and healthy living. Afterward, we have tea and sometimes a fashion show."



The Power of Touch lobbies the government to listen to the voice of senior citizens in all sectors. PoT is also very hands-on, organizing courses for digital learning and mentoring. She explained, "I did a mentorship program with the Swedish Chamber of Commerce that resulted in an ongoing mentorship program. We select senior professionals and train them to mentor young people wanting to start their own businesses."

When you look through the e-book, you will find many examples of useful community projects in countries around the world. The descriptions are linked to toolkits or websites where further descriptions are freely available for your use. Here are six examples of the good work going on:

- 1. A group of good samaritans using a 3D printer to make free respirator valves
- 2. Volunteer-based tutoring programs such as Teacher 2 Neighbor and Tutor.com
- 3. Reclaiming Work: The Cycle Couriers subverting the Gig Economy through new bike delivery cooperatives across Europe
- 4. A toolkit to find out how to build a phone tree.
- 5. New ROSCAs (Rotating Credit and Savings Associations) created by individuals who fill the role of informal financial institutions. These alternative financial vehicles are flourishing.
- 6. Tiny houses that are becoming increasingly popular, according to the Low Income Housing Institute. Advocates for the homeless and tiny house enthusiasts agree that downsizing is the best option for the times.



Albania: Poverty eradication is an obligation



It was Mahatma Gandhi who said, "Poverty is the worst form of violence."

The Albanian Society for All Ages (ASAG) is the only voice for older women in Albania. Ermira Pirdeni, ASAG Executive Director, is appalled by how much COVID-19 has exacerbated what existed in a "prevailing

culture of indifference" at the intersection of several crises: an ageing population, inequality, environmental degradation, rising insecurity, and poverty.

Ermira says, "Older women are tired of talking. They want action. Our movement, created in 1991, generates much emotion but the results are scarce due to institutional indifference. We cannot remain indifferent when our pensions do not allow us to live a decent, dignified life." Two examples illustrate the dire situation many older women are facing: Virgjini Ristani (82) after working 50 years with the State Ensemble Folk Songs and Dances, receives a monthly pension of 170€ (US \$201); while Lirie Veliag (73), caregiver to her husband and sister (82), receives 70€ (US \$83). "Community development is needed to cure a society made sick by isolation, selfishness and rootlessness. Policy makers miss this simple idea," says Ermira.

Similar messages from other countries have led Moira and Jan to name Economic Security as the third of three priority action areas for the Pass It On Network beginning in 2021.
